



Hampshire Cricket Disciplinary Rules

(Adapted from the ECB Model Disciplinary Rules)

1. CODE OF CONDUCT AND THE SPIRIT OF CRICKET

1.1 Code of Conduct

- 1.1.1 Hampshire Cricket (HC) is committed to maintaining the highest standards of behaviour and conduct. This Code of Conduct incorporates the Spirit of Cricket, as set out below. It applies to all matches played under the auspices of HC and may be applied to cricket in general.
- 1.1.2 The captains are responsible at all times for ensuring that play is conducted within the Spirit of Cricket as well as within the Laws.
- 1.1.3 Players and team officials must at all times accept the umpire's decision. Players must not show dissent at the umpire's decision or react in a provocative or disapproving manner towards another player or a spectator.
- 1.1.4 Players and team officials shall not intimidate, assault or attempt to intimidate or assault an umpire, another player or a spectator.
- 1.1.5 Players and team officials shall not use crude and/or abusive language (known as "sledging") nor make offensive gestures or hand signals nor deliberately distract an opponent.
- 1.1.6 Players and team officials shall not make racially abusive comments nor indulge in racially abusive actions against fellow players, officials, members and supporters. HC operates an active open door policy whilst respecting player qualification regulations and welcomes players irrespective of ethnic origin.
- 1.1.7 Players and team officials shall not use or in any way be concerned in the use or distribution of illegal drugs.
- 1.1.8 HC will take adequate steps to ensure the good behaviour of their players and parents towards opponents and officials as outlined in codes of conduct for players, parents/guardians and families and managers/coaches

1.2 The Spirit of Cricket

Cricket is a game that owes much of its unique appeal to the fact that it should be played not only within its Laws, but also within the Spirit of the Game. Any action which is seen to abuse this spirit causes injury to the game itself. The major responsibility for ensuring the spirit of fair play rests with the captains.

- 1.2.1 There are two Laws which place the responsibility for the team's conduct firmly on the captain.

Responsibility of Captains

The captains are responsible at all times for ensuring that play is conducted within the Spirit of the Game as well as within the Laws.

Player's Conduct

In the event of any player failing to comply with the instructions of an umpire, criticising his decision by word or action, showing dissent, or generally behaving in a manner which might bring the game into disrepute, the umpire concerned shall in the first place report the matter to the other umpire and to the player's captain, requesting the latter to take action.



Fair and Unfair Play

According to the Laws, umpires are the sole judges of fair and unfair play. The umpires may intervene at any time, and it is the responsibility of the captain to take action where required.

1.2.2 The umpires are authorised to intervene in cases of:

- Time wasting
- Damaging the pitch
- Dangerous or unfair bowling
- Tampering with the ball
- Any other action that they consider to be unfair.

1.2.3 The Spirit of the Game involves RESPECT for:

- Your opponents
- Your own captain and team
- The role of the umpires
- The game's traditional values

1.2.4 It is against the Spirit of the Game:

- To dispute an umpire's decision by word, action or gesture
- To direct abusive language towards an opponent or umpire
- To indulge in cheating or any sharp practice, for instance
 - a) appeal knowing the batsman is not out
 - b) advance towards an umpire in an aggressive manner when appealing
 - c) seek to distract an opponent either verbally or by harassment with persistent clapping or unnecessary noise under the guise of enthusiasm and motivation of one's own side.

1.2.5 Violence

There is no place for any act of violence on the field of play.

Players

Captains and umpires together set the tone for the conduct of a cricket match. Every player is expected to make an important contribution to this.

1.3 Failure to comply with the provisions of this Paragraph 1 may lead to disciplinary action, irrespective of an alleged breach being related to a match not under the jurisdiction of the League.

2. DISCIPLINARY REGULATIONS

2.1 Aims and Jurisdiction

These regulations shall apply to any player who plays for any team at any level under the auspices of the HC and are intended to provide assistance and uniformity in dealing with any alleged breach of the ECB Code of Conduct and the Spirit of Cricket (Paragraph 1).

2.2 Procedure

2.2.1 Any alleged breach of Paragraph 1 above may result in the player receiving a verbal warning from their Manager and/or Coach. If the coach/manager considers the breach to be of a serious nature then it shall be notified in writing (to be known as 'a Complaint') to the Head of Women & Girls Cricket. Upon receipt of such a complaint,



and as soon as reasonably practicable, the Head of Women & Girls Cricket shall consider the complaint.

2.2.2 After investigation, the decision of the Head of Women & Girls Cricket will be sent to the parent, in writing, and will be full and final.

2.3 Penalties

If the Head of Women & Girls Cricket finds the alleged offence proved he/she shall have the power to impose one or more of the following penalties as it deems appropriate:

2.3.1 In the case of a player:

2.3.1.1 To require the player to submit appropriate letter(s) of apology within a specified time.

2.3.1.2 To record a reprimand and to give a warning as to future conduct.

2.3.1.3 To suspend the player for one or more matches, or for a stated period of time

2.3.1.4 To expel the player from the County Age Group Squad.

2.3.1.5 The Head of Women & Girls Cricket shall have the power to suspend the implementation of any part, or all, of the penalty it imposes for such period and subject to such terms and conditions he/she deems appropriate
